WASHINGTON, DC – May 7, 2020 – The <u>Small UAV Coalition</u> is pleased to announce that <u>Workhorse</u> (WKHS), maker of the fully functional end-to-end drone delivery system <u>Horsefly</u>, has joined the Coalition as an Associate member.
